THE PRESIDENT'S COLUMN

The Congress is beginning its ninth year, and we have passed the 5,000 mark in membership. In fact, we must be around 5,500 members as we go to press. Mark my words--there will be 7,000 come next October 1.

Had a few interesting letters from an individual who took the position that a hand such as Q-5-5-5 should score 40 points instead of 28. Here is his argument: the 15/2s with the queen and the fives total 8 points; the 15/2s of the fives another 8 points; and instead of counting 12 for four-of-a-kind, he would skip that and use 4 combinations of 3 fives, which score 6 points each. Four times the 6 points = 24 plus the 16 points from the 15/2s, the hand would be worth 40 points. How do you rebut his argument?

There are thousands of people trying to invent table games and make a fortune; for example, the inventors of Monopoly, Scrabble and Trivial Pursuit. Many of them try to twist, bend, and combine our cribbage game with one of their ideas, hoping that they will hit the table game jackpot. Every once in a while, someone sends me a sample of his/her creation for my comments. People also attempt to design cribbage boards with special features, even changing the game.

Another idea is to tamper with the playing cards, such as changing the faces or

even changing the colors of the heart, club and spade. About 50 years ago, someone proposed a fifth suit in the deck, "Eagles," and made the pack 65 cards. They had a little success; they did get the deck manufactured, but the public rejected the innovation. Card-players will not stand for having the pack of cards, with all the history behind it, being altered.

Our advice to the inventors is--find something else to take that one-in-a-million shot of developing a super table game. Leave cribbage and the pack of cards out of your dreams. You have better odds in playing the state lotteries.

An afterthought: the Madison Committee on the World Masters Tournament, the first tournament staged under the format we are using, realized the need for a special tournament board to replace the "snake board," which was causing pegging errors. They wanted to make the Long Boards public domain, so every cribbage person would not have to pay royalties. The three architects were Eddie Green, Ted Blackney, and Joe Wergin. Green placed second in the National Open of 1978 and Blackney is now deceased.

The Long Board is the best creation since the drilling of the standard peg board in the year 1635.

SYNOPSIS OF ACC BOARD MEETING

August 7, 1987

Raleigh, North Carolina

Treasurer Fred McGibney's report for Invitational was approved as follows:

The year ending June 30, 1987, showed a loss of \$736.79 (\$34,553.19 income and \$35,089.98 expenses), with a cash balance of \$3,558.49, including \$585.00 earmarked for the Cribbader General Junior program. 1986-87 membership: 4,920. Report accepted.

McGibney also presented a tentative \$46,627 budget for 1987-88, based on 5,000 members. Directors deferred action until the next meeting, September 25 at Hartford, Connecticut, looking to reduce an expected \$9,227 deficit with a suggested dues increase, possible second-class mailing savings for CRIBBAGE WORLD, deletion of revised rules book and its mailing (due to adequate supply on hand for the coming year) and other possible cost-saving measures.

Howard Baum explained his tournament's round-robin playoff as compared to the head-to-head playoff system and was given approval by majority vote under the grandfather clause.

Various Constitution and By-Law amendments were adopted, accomplishing recommended revisions to complete the Reorganization Plan approved in principle at the 1987 Reno Board meeting. Additional clean-up amendments will be considered at the next Board meeting to conclude the action.

Director Bob Gilbert's invitation to hold the 1990 Grand National at the Ramada in Des Moines, Iowa, was unanimously approved. Other Grand National dates for the future: 1988, September 23-25, Milwaukie; 1989, Prineville, Oregon.

Tournament Commissioner Syl Lulinski announced that the Sands, Reno, is adding \$7,000 to the purses of the ACC Invitational and Western Open next year, February 5-7, 1988.

A Board meeting has also been scheduled in conjunction with those events on Thursday, February 4, 1988.

The criteria for participation in the 1988

Invitational was approved as follows:

1. Top 100 players for the past 3 years;
2. Top 50 players this year from all regions, including all those with as many or more points than the lowest #50 player in any of the regions;
3. All members of the Board of Directors;
4. All past Directors who have served at least 5 years on the Board but failed re-election this year;
5. The top 10% of all 6 Grass Roots divisions;
6. The winner of any main sanctioned tournament;
7. The top 25 players from the Rhode Island League;
8. The top 16 winners of the 1987 Invitational.

New 1987-88 officers were elected under the reorganized guidelines: President, Joe Wergin; Executive Vice President, Syl Lulinski; Vice President Policy, Ev Bey; Vice President Operations, Harry Palmer.

Two members were elected to the ACC Hall of Fame, to be inducted at the annual awards dinner at the Grand National in Hartford, Connecticut, September 26, 1987: Bob Madsen of Niles, Illinois, and R.E. "Rasty" Rasmussen, Anamosa, Iowa.

The Board authorized Membership Secretary Jim Law to spend \$350 to upgrade his computer to accommodate ACC records and sold the old ACC computer to Bob Madsen for \$500.

Grass Roots Commissioner Jerry Dickin-son reported that program now has 1,246 members playing in 46 clubs.

Directors expressed thanks to Nick Pond and WRAL-TV for hosting lunch during its meeting and extended thanks to outgoing Chairman of the Board Dick Graham and retiring Directors.

WE'RE SAD TO HAVE TO
SAY GOODBYE

Twenty months ago I took over as editor of CRIBBAGE WORLD from a very over-worked Bob Madsen. Over the years I had been involved with five little publications ranging from my high school days helping an uncle put out the weekly Richmond, Maine, Bee, a Jaycees monthly in Newburyport, Massachusetts, to a corporate departmental quarterly in Hartford, Connecticut. I guess the most fun was putting out a 4-page daily aboard a troop carrier crossing the Pacific, returning home from Korea in 1954. We'd pick up the news from the radio shack at 3 a.m., and we rushed to meet a new deadline every day as we crossed the International Date Line and the various time zones; that job lasted only 16 days, and it took as many days after for the mimeograph ink to wear away from beneath my fingernails. None of these publications exists today, and I find that

During the past 20 months we've attempted to deliver a quality journal for about 19¢ a copy, exclusive of mailing costs. The masthead was changed for a better appearance, and we tried to cram in as much cribbage news as possible. We went to two margined columns instead of running the type across the page; we placed all ads at the bottom of the page for neatness. We increased ad revenue from \$600 to \$1,400. In February 1986, we mailed 2,800 CRIBBAGE WORLDS; last month we mailed out 5,100. Bob Plourde and I struggled to write articles and editorials to get out the vote, and we were pleased to see the ballots jump from 650 to over 1,600. We began publishing "Letters to Cribbage World," "The President's Column," feature articles on cribbage, and we printed BOD minutes.

We didn't please everybody, we knew that was impossible, but we're proud of the fact that we received over 300 letters from members telling us they enjoyed what we were doing, 5 letters of constructive criticism, and 4 letters of complaint. Not bad for two guys working on the rear deck in the summertime and at the kitchen table during inclement weather with a bottle of paste, a pen, a pair of scissors and a ruler.

Now it's time to go and turn CRIBBAGE WORLD over to someone else to improve it even further. Someday I hope to see a flashy CRIBBAGE WORLD with glossy pages and pictures and 2 or 3 colors, involving a staff of volunteers. I wish it could have happened during my tenure, but that wasn't to be.

We'll hang in there until a suitable replacement is found. A person is needed with a commitment to publish a little newspaper that informs all the membership fairly and honestly. We tried not to slant, not to be geographical, not to print just one point of view, and we hope our successor will feel the same way.

An organization's publication informs and it is what welds the membership together or what can destroy a delicate balance. It was really fun serving the ACC membership and reading and hearing your kind comments. Last but not least, many, many thanks to all who contributed articles and material; you made our job easier.

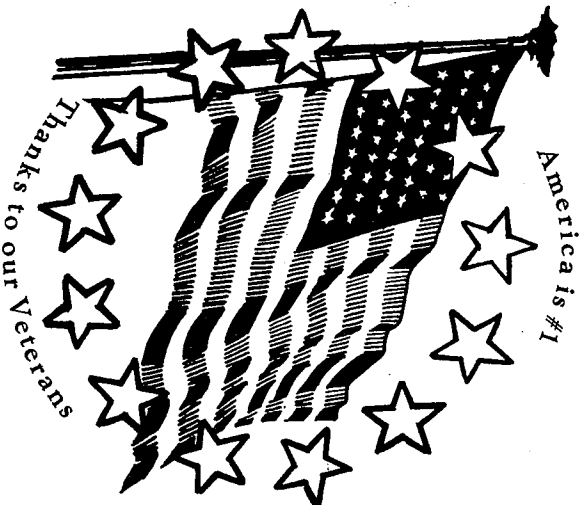
